9. **How do you prepare a dish?** (what do you need? – ingredients, preparations – to peel, to chop, to mix, to fry, to boil, to serve)
10. **What do you do when you want to buy something?** (to go shopping, a department store is four stops away from my home, to choose products, to ask a shop assistant for help, to try on clothes, to buy groceries at the grocery, to come up to a cash desk, to pay for the goods, to pay in cash/by credit card, to collect and pack things, to leave a shop)
11. **How do you get to school?** (to go to the bus stop, to get on a bus, to go four stops, to get off at the fifth stop, to get off the bus, to change buses, to go on foot)
12. **How can you get from your school to the bus/railway station?** (to turn left/right, to go along a street till the traffic lights, to take the second turning on your right)
13. **How can you travel/move about in a small town/in a big city?** It depends on the distance (to go by bus/tram/tube/bike/on foot) to go past the church, to go straight.
14. **Ways of traveling in a big/small country** (by bus/car/train/plane/ship/ferry) It's a through train. How much is the (single/return) ticket? Are there discounts for students?
15. **What interesting can you see in Poland and in your region?** (the mountains, the sea, the capital, the Blue Springs, Sulejowski Lake, Polish bison, caves, Spała)
16. **Where are you from?/What's your nationality?/What's the capital of Poland?** I'm from Poland - I'm Polish – The capital of Poland is Warsaw.
